Topic at Annual Meeting

Our subdivisions are over 25 years old and we are witnessing the breakdown of equipment. Our electrical systems are corroded and not working, we just replaced our park equipment that was a liability, our trails have broken pipes below them and the area is beginning to collapse, which is dangerous for our residents. Our signs throughout the neighborhood are missing or rotten from the flood and are in dire need of replacement. The weir on lake one is broken and sinking, therefore, draining the lake and compromising the lots on the lake.

We want to address the most imminent issues first. Repair of the collapsing pipes beneath our trail near lake four will cost approximately \$15,000. To repair the weir in lake one will cost approximately \$25,000+. These two issues alone are \$40,000. The lighting on Shadows at White Oak Blvd. had to be replaced due to old wiring that is corroded and broken. We also had to replace the transformer. Now the lights on Shadows Lake blvd. are out.

There are numerous other issues that need addressing, as our subdivision ages, more repairs are needed. Our budget doesn't come close to accommodating the needed repairs. Therefore, we are proposing a \$100 increase in our dues at the annual meeting in Sept. Beginning January 2021, our dues would be \$400. This annual amount is still low considering the values of our homes. We are chancing the repairs will hold off until after the first of next year due to lack of funds.

We expect that this will be the last increase for a long time. Since the flood, we have had a tremendous amount of repairs. Last year, our budget was over by \$40,000 due to repairs.

Shadows Community exists of three subdivisions under one dues system. There are expansive grounds to be maintained in the three subdivisions and we are beginning to see more underground pipe issues arise in addition to other improvements we want to implement, such as a security system.

We are asking that you vote with us, for the increase, so we may continue to maintain the integrity of our community and protect our property values. We all have large investments to protect, so lets all do what we can to make sure this happens!

There will be a ballot asking for your vote in the next newsletter. If you are unable to attend the meeting (date and time TBD) please send in your vote so that your voice will be heard!

The broken pipes are threatening to wash out the trail and drain the lake. Without an increase in dues, it will erode further.



No Cast Fishing in Lakes!

We have received several complaints of people casting nets into our lakes in an effort to catch large amounts of fish. This is absolutely prohibited. We will enforce this restriction using the Sherriff's Dept. if necessary. Our lakes are for the enjoyment of our residents only. There has always been a catch and release policy in place, however, we do not mind residents keeping their catch as long as it is not excessive. If we continue to see excessive amounts of fish removed from our lakes, we will be forced to enforce the catch and release policy again. We recently had a report of several men fishing in Lake 2 that were not residents of our subdivision. These are private lakes for use of residents and their guests only. We will ask the Sherriff's Department to check with non-residents around our lakes and they will be asked to leave.

Grilled Pineapple Teriyaki Chicken



Prep: 10 min. Cook: 15 min. Serves: 4

INGREDIENTS:

- 4 boneless skinless chicken breasts
- ½ cup brown sugar
- ½ cup soy sauce
- ¼ cup pineapple juice
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- ¼ tsp pepper
- ½ tsp salt
- 1 Tbsp cornstarch
- 1 Tbsp water
- Garnish with green onions and sesame seeds

PREPARATION:

- In a small saucepan, whisk together the brown sugar, soy sauce, pineapple juice, garlic, pepper, and salt. In a small bowl, whisk together the water and cornstarch. Slowly whisk into the mixture.
- Bring to boil and boil about 1-3 minutes until the mixture just starts to thicken.
 Remove from heat and reserve ¼ cup of the sauce for later.
- Marinate the chicken in the sauce in the fridge for at least 30 minutes. Grill the
 chicken on each side for 6-7 minutes or until no longer pink. Put the chicken on the
 plate and brush with reserved sauce before serving. Garnish with green onion
 and sesame seeds if desired.

PREPARATION:

- 1. Pour ice and moscato into a blender.
- Blend on high speed for about 30 seconds.
- Pour into your serving glass and garnish with a strawberry.

Add fruit to the blender for added flavor!

Berry Cobbler on the Grill



INGREDIENTS FOR 10 SERVINGS:

- 2 cans biscuit dough
- ½ cup sugar
- · 1/2 cup flour
- ½ tbsp cinnamon
- ½ tsp salt
- 1 ½ cups blueberry
- 1 ½ cups strawberry
- 1 ½ cups blackberry

- 1 ½ cups raspberry
- ½ cup sugar
- 3 tbsp cornstarch
- ice cream, for topping

PREPARATION:

- 1. Cut biscuits into small even pieces (about 9 per biscuit) and place in a bowl.
- 2. Sprinkle sugar, flour, cinnamon, and salt over the dough bites. Mix well.
- On the grill, using a disposable foil pan or grill proof pan, combine blueberries, strawberries, blackberries, raspberries, sugar, and cornstarch. Stir well and let cook until fruit starts to release its juices.
- 4. Cover fruit with the cinnamon sugar-coated biscuit dough in as even a layer as possible.
- 5. Cover pan tightly with foil and close the grill. Keeping the temperature at 350°F (175°C) grill for 20 minutes.
- 6. Take the foil off pan and close grill again for 10 more minutes, or until dough is cooked through and golden brown. (Times and temperatures may vary based on grill).
- 7. Remove from the grill & serve with a scoop of ice cream.
- 8. Enjoy!

Amending the Restrictions

Therefore, we will be voting on a new amendment that will allow the HOA to fine violators. After written notification to comply is sent, a deadline is given, if still to no avail, then a fine will be levied and if not paid, a lien will be placed on the violators home. Its unfortunate it has come to this but a few can ruin values for all of us by not complying with the restrictions. Restrictions are there to protect our values and the integrity of our community. We hope you will vote with us to protect our investments.

Neighborhood Dogs

The HOA has received complaints about dogs leaving their calling card in other neighbors' yards. Some residents are under the mistaken idea that the HOA has authority over this issue. The HOA does not! There is a city ordinance against dogs defecating in someone's yard. Animal Control has the authority to enforce the ordinance, not our HOA.

The HOA is made up of residents, just like you, that are willing to try to help the community. They are here to enforce the restrictions. They have no authority over loud parties, parking on the street, dogs barking, the color of someone's front door etc. Please understand, they are residents trying to help. They hold jobs, have families and calling them about the aforementioned issues is the equivalent of us calling you to do something about someone's dog, etc. The ACC and the HOA are volunteers only and are not responsible for neighbor to neighbor issues.

That said, let's remember that it is indeed the neighborly thing to do to pick up after your pet. Pet waste contains a variety of disease causing organism such as Salmonella, Giardia Lamblia and Fecal Coliform. These organisms can cause humans to become quite ill if they into contact with or with water that has been polluted by them. Pet waste that is not disposed of properly carries these contaminants into our waterways and can cause algae blooms. As they die, algae deplete water of oxygen, effectively suffocating plant and aquatic life.
